
Get Ready For the VGC's Third Annual Botany & Booze Coming In May

Steel City Rowing Club (SCRC)

Perhaps you have seen the three-story building on Verona's southernmost boundary. Since 1996, Steel City Rowing, Club has been connecting rowers, nonrowers, nature lovers, and party hosts to what they love...and to the river.

Every summer, children participate in camps where they kayak, swim, and learn river ecology. Adults use the public launch for water recreation. Members participate in river cleanups and maintain native landscaping. In winter, groups exercise together. Stand in the parking lot at dusk and you will hear an energizing playlist encouraging the rhythmic whir of rowing machines spinning in unison- creating a motivating group intensity.

Rowing is prominent, of course. Pittsburgh's rivers offer an exciting, unique way to exercise through this lifelong, low-impact, sport. Youth/teens can participate in seasonal rowing programs or camp. Adults can discover rowing through a Free Intro Day, Learn-to-Row program, or team. Experienced rowers and true beginners can enroll in any of the above.

The Boathouse also offers rental space unlike any other. Along the riverfront, newlyweds take jaw-dropping photos at twilight...guests dine in the airy boathouse adorned with twinkle lights...occasionally someone is drawn onto the balcony to gaze at the stars or steal a breath of crisp air. The flexible space supports many sized events and corporate gatherings. It is said that being on or near water can make us happier, connected, and better at other things we do. Open The (Back) Door To a Roth IRA

There aren't many drawbacks to having a high income — but being unable to invest in a Roth IRA might be one of them. Are there strategies that allow high-income earners to contribute to this valuable retirement account? Before we delve into that question, let's consider the rules. In 2023, you can contribute the full amount to a Roth IRA — \$6,500, or \$7,500 if you're 50 or older — if your modified

adjusted gross income is less than \$138,000 (if you're single) or \$218,000 (if you're married and filing jointly).

A Roth IRA is an attractive retirement savings vehicle because earnings and withdrawals are tax-free, provided you've had your account for at least five years and you don't start taking money out until you're 591/2. Also, with a Roth IRA, you won't be required to take required minimum distributions (RMDs) when you turn 73, which will allow your account to potentially keep growing. But given your income, how can you contribute to a Roth? You may want to consider what's known as a "backdoor Roth" strategy. Essentially, this involves contributing money to a new traditional IRA, or taking money from an existing one, and then converting the funds to a Roth IRA. The process is straightforward, but you'll need to consider potential tax implications. If you convert pretax assets from your traditional IRA to a Roth IRA, the amount converted will be fully taxable in the year of the conversion. Consult with your tax advisor to determine if a backdoor Roth makes sense for you — if so, it could be a valuable addition to your financial strategy.






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Something New at Oakmont Carnegie Library

Native plants are coming back in a big way in Verona-and for good reason! Including native plants in gardens, yards, and greenspaces, benefits neighbors, helps heal our local ecosystem, and provides food and habitat to species on the brink of extinction like the Monarch butterfly, Rusty-Patched Bumble Bee, and the Sedge Wren.

Native plants have many natural benefits because they are organically adapted to local pollinators (like those listed above) and growing conditions. Native plants:

• Strongly support the ecosystem • Are easy to maintain (naturally suited for the local climate, weather, and soil) • Can help mitigate flooding • Can help manage pest populations • Do not require pesticides, fertilizers, or other chemical products • Are typically perennials or self-seeding (economical and timesaving) • Provide interest and splendor to gardens and landscapes

Unfortunately for consumers, native plants that have not been genetically altered by humans (called "straight species") can be tricky to find. Most local nurseries carry versions of native plants



that have been modified and likely no longer provide the same services and optimum food and shelter for native pollinators, birds, and the ecosystem as a

In an effort to bridge this gap and make straight-species native plants easier for residents and businesses to access, SEE Green Sustainability Group will be launching a new native plant project for Verona and surrounding communities.

To make this happen, volunteers will be carefully stratifying, germinating, and growing select native plants to provide for free, such as bright orange Butterfly Weed, Whorled Milkweed, Aromatic Asters, Black-Eyed Susans, and more. Other species may be acquired through suggested donations of \$4/each, which will benefit SEE Green's sustainable and restorative projects in Verona. Species that may be acquired by donation include eye-catching Blazing Stars, Spotted Bee Balm, Purple Coneflowers, and more.

Here's how to get yours! If you are interested in receiving one (or maybe several) native plants that specifically benefit our geographical area and ecosystem, please reach out to Rhea at rhea.sunshine.pgh@gmail.com. More updates including a menu of available plants will be provided as the growing season progresses and volunteers are able to more accurately gauge the success of each species that we are attempting to grow. Seedlings are expected to be ready for distribution in the summer months. Safe soil practices are being followed.

This free native plant program is a project by Verona's SEE Green Sustainability Group, which is a committee of the Verona Community


- 1. \$125.00 non-refundable Vendor fee due April 14, 2023. Filling out this application does not guarantee a space, but payment and proper documentation does. Attendance is mandatory, rain or shine. If you choose to come intermittently to our market you must provide a schedule by April 14th to better serve our patrons, and help our vendors maintain consistent market traffic.
- 2. Market Day is every Thursday 2 pm-7 pm (Set up can begin no more than 2 hours prior, sales are prohibited until 2 pm, and any sellers selling before will be asked to leave.)
- 3. Sellers must have prices displayed
- 4. All products and promotions must be kept within your selling area
- 5. Vendors must send in their certificate of Liability Insurance with an application with Borough of Verona and Verona Chamber of Commerce were added as additional insurers.
- 6. Any vendor selling a product that requires some form of licensing or Farmers Market Permit from Allegheny County MUST keep a copy on hand.
- 7. No smoking at the market
- 8. All pets must be on a leash
- 9. Vendors are responsible for bringing their personal tables, chairs, tents, etc. all items must be secured.
- 10. Vendors may park their vehicles/truck in the allotted space.

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FROM WESTERN PENNSYLVANIA TO PASADENA, CALIFORNIA

n the early 1900s baseball news dominated the sports pages of all the United States major newspapers.

Football, and in particular college ball, was the only major football around. Professional football teams were not created until the late 1920s. An interesting sidelight about the professional teams is that Western Pennsylvania was very influential in the birth of pro football. The Latrobe Athletic Association began initiating recruitment of college-graduated football players, even paying some a fee. The organized Latrobe Association teams struggled to sustain regularly scheduled games, while Ohio teams - Canton, Columbus, and Cleveland survived. As we know, Canton Ohio claims to be the birthplace of professional football, even housing the Football Hall of Fame.

College football was so brutal in 1906 - nineteen players died and one hundred thirty-seven sustained serious injuries. This was the major stats of college football and because of these tragic incidences, President Theodore Roosevelt threatened to ban all college football. New rules were proposed along with better equipment that was accepted by the major college teams.

In 1908 in the small Western Pennsylvania town of Washington, the local college, Washington & Jefferson (W&J) was making eastern football fans take notice. They had won eleven games, tied Army, and competed against Yale, the eastern power.

In 1910, Princeton, Army, and Harvard were considered the best in the country. For the next five years, Washington & Jefferson had excellent teams. The nationwide sports magazine, Spaulding Football Guide, in 1914 placed W&J second in the east after Harvard. In 1917 W&J defeated Yale 13 to 7, making national news in the sports world.

In 1921 W&J won all thirteen scheduled games but in an unprecedented action, the University of Detroit Michigan declared itself the number one team in all the East. This prompted the coaches of W&J to schedule a game with Detroit. The University of Detroit agreed with the stipulation the game be played in Detroit. During the game, the W&J quarterback was injured and the halfback, Prunner West, assumed the position of quarterback.

Shortly after the news spread that W&J beat Detroit, this small Western Pennsylvania team received a telegram from the Rose Committee inviting them to Pasadena, California to play the Golden Bears of California who had a two-year undefeated record. The venue was the Tournament of Roses game which was to be played on January 2, 1922. The previous year's opponent, Ohio State University was beaten 28 to 0. After word spread that W&J was invited to California, the Ohio State coaches contacted W&J cautioning them to consider not going too early due to California's excessively hot weather.

The Athletic Director mortgaged his home as the college had no money to fund the trip. On December 24, 1921, twenty players and four coaches left by train, with the first stop in Pittsburgh, Chicago then Kansas City. At each stop, the team ran drills and dummy scrimmages. It just so happened that while in Kansas City, a player contracted pneumonia and had to be hospitalized. Unknown to the coaches, one player who did not officially make the roster was a stowaway and thus became the needed fill-in. Arriving in California, they were greeted by days and days of rain. The practice was strictly regimented.

Prunner West became the first African American to play in a quarterback position. He later attended Howard University in Washington D.C. and became a renowned surgeon.

As game time got close, the players were surprised when informed that they were expected to be participants in the Parade wearing their uniforms before playing the game.

Years later, this event was known as the Rose Bowl Tournament after a new bowl-style stadium was built.

Over 40,000 fans attended the game. The playing field was muddy due to a week of rain. W&J scored a

touchdown early that was called back due to a penalty. The game ended 0 to 0 and was a brutal contest.

This small college only had about 450 students but made national headlines. The Red and Black Express, as they were dubbed by the California newspapers, relished in their new national notoriety.

Two years later, W&J coach, Robert Murphy got ill and died of Pernicious Anemia, a blood disorder that, at that time, had no known treatment or cure.

Some say, now and then, in December, the whiff of roses can be detected around the W&J campus.
