
Council Appoints New Councilman, John Gemellas

John Gemellas has been sworn in as Verona Council's newest member.

Nancy Carpenter, a Council incumbent ran for both the four-year and the two-year term in the General Election. Winning both seats, she chose the four-year term thus leaving the two-year term for Council to appoint a new Councilperson.

Mr. Gemellas is employed by the Avalotis Corporation, headquartered in Verona. He works as a project sourcing specialist for the Corporation. Having received his High School diploma in 1989 from Riverview High School he went on and earned a bachelor's degree in political science from the



Also seeking to win the Council's decisive vote was civically active, Angela Occhipinti, a zoning hearing board member, and former Verona Garden Club president. With Council all agreeing that this was a tough vote to cast, due to both candidates having such highly regarded skill sets, Gemellas was appointed following a 4-2 vote, with Councilwomen Nancy Carpenter and Sylvia Provenza voting for Angela Occhipinti. For the record, both candidates agreed to help the borough regardless of their selection to the council.







Rules and Regulations 2024 Season

Market Begins June 6th, 2024

- 1. \$75.00 non-refundable Vendor fee due May 3rd, filling out this application does not guarantee a space, payment, and proper documentation does. Attendance is mandatory, rain or shine. If you choose to come intermittently to our market you must provide a schedule by May 3rd in order to better serve our customers, and help our vendors maintain consistent market traffic. \$25/Monthly is now an option for sporadic vending.
- 2. Market Day is every Thursday from 2:00 pm-to 7:00 pm (Set up can begin no more than 2 hours prior, sales are prohibited until 2:00 pm, any sellers selling before will be asked to leave.) You must be in your space by 1:30 pm for the safety of our patrons and vendors setting up.
- 3. Sellers must have prices displayed
- 4. All products and promotions must be kept within your selling area
- 5. Vendors must send in the certificate of Liability Insurance with application with Borough of Verona and Verona Chamber of Commerce added as additional insurers
- 6. Any vendor selling a product that requires some form of licensing or a Farmers Market Permit from Allegheny County MUST keep a copy on hand.
- 7. No smoking at the market
- 8. All pets must be on a leash
- 9. Vendors are responsible for bringing their tables, chairs, tents, etc. All items must be secured.
- 10. Vendors may park their vehicles/trucks in the allotted space.
- *** At the end of every market day, allotted space must be cleared of debris in the provided garbage containers.



COUNCIL'S JANUARY 23, 2024 WORKSHOP SESSION

As many residents of Verona have already heard, our Chief of Police, Ron McLemore, was recently injured during a domestic disturbance and has not been able to return to active duty. This fact has strained an already undersized police force, forcing it to take emergency measures to protect the safety of Verona's residents. The council has sought the assistance of the Pennsylvania State Police to assist it in its law enforcement efforts until Verona's Council can find a remedy for this unfortunate dilemma. Meanwhile, our meager force has managed to fill in the gaps as best as possible and is doing an admirable job under the circumstances.

As a result of this sequence of events, the Council has been thrust into the ring and forced to wrestle with finding the best solution, in the shortest time possible, to the question, "How will it find the resources to hire a police force of a size adequate to protect its Citizens based on current budget realities?"

Currently, there seem to be several workable solutions on the horizon. One option would be to maintain the Borough's prior practice of hiring and maintaining a small police force. But this is dangerously impractical as was just demonstrated.

Another option might be to raise Verona's property taxes just enough to pay for the hiring of more police. The citizens of Verona would be better protected, but at what cost? Everything goes up in price. It's called *The Cost-of-Living Index*. When we contemplate a tax increase, we must ask ourselves, "Is there a realistic price for protecting our families, our homes, and our Borough? As a

hypothetical example, would taxpayers be willing to pay a tax increase of, let's say, \$100, or \$200, over the course of a year? That equates to between 27¢ and 55¢ a day. Q: What can you buy today for these prices? A: Community "life insurance" for ourselves, and our loved ones, with safer streets due to an adequately funded, well-trained, local police force.

A third option, which is possibly more complicated, offers hope for potential fiscal rewards via *regionalization* between two (or more) mutually agreeing municipalities. In Verona's case, its policing resources would be combined and shared with an *accepting* and *cooperative* second, autonomous municipality.

For this discussion, Verona Council, at its January 23rd Workshop Session, invited Chief Gerald Simpson, the State of Pennsylvania appointed guest speaker, retired police Chief, and expert negotiator/consultant to speak about the regionalization process. Chief Simpson discussed both the high and low points of such a venture as well as the sequence of steps to be followed before any such merger takes place. He also addressed and answered the Council's and the attending audience's questions and concerns in concise and easy-to-understand terms.

No municipalities were named as potential candidates to merge with Verona at this Workshop Session. The council's demeanor was one of keen interest, mixed with cautious optimism, concern, and uncertainty as to whether, and, if so, how to proceed with any ongoing steps in the process

In attendance were both Verona's State Representative Joe McAndrew and Penn Hill's Mayor Pauline Calabrese. Both attended the meeting to gather information and insight concerning regionalization and Verona's dilemma.

The few public attendees who did voice their opinions were generally supportive of regionalizing police forces. Their rationale revolved around the idea of mutual cost savings that both municipalities would benefit from when resources such as personnel, supplies, and equipment are purchased and shared between merged municipalities as opposed to each municipality incurring the full cost of these resources.

What action(s) the Borough Council takes next is anyone's guess at this point. Everyone on the Council realizes the importance and time-sensitivity of this matter and will treat it with the utmost urgency. This is an especially critical issue facing our town. We are all affected by any one of these workable solutions. Every one of us needs to take a special interest during events over the next few weeks. These are extremely tough decisions facing our elected Officials. Let us be understanding and supportive of their efforts and thank our Regional Officials who will certainly play a part in decisions that could modify Verona's current standard operating procedure.

As a concerned Verona resident, I am writing this editorial based on my observations and consequent impressions following the January 23rd Workshop Session.

"DOGS CAN'T FLY"

September 1945 saw the end of World War II. The war itself brought many innovations that evolved into civilian life. The Jeep played a large part in the war effort, and the small utility vehicles were adopted by American civilians. Walkie-Talkies began the acceptance of present cell phones that over 95% of the world's population possess and use daily.

The Jeep and cell phones are here to stay but one company, Greyhound Bus Lines tried to carry over helicopters from the war to its advantage for mass transportation. The 1940s were a rapid technological advancement in America (and with that thought in mind) Greyhound purchased two large-capacity Sikorsky Huey helicopters and established the "Greyhound Skyways" Division in Detroit, Michigan in 1946. The idea was to provide a solution to the chronic overcrowding on the Greyhound system and turning major cities into bustling helicopter hubs. The plan was to use the roofs of its already existing bus stations as landing pads for a fleet of helicopters.

Greyhound got the go-ahead for a trial period, charging \$5 for short introductory rides. Pittsburgh, Cleveland, Detroit, and New York were among the other eastern cities that participated in this experiment. Costs incurred for purchasing the helicopters, retraining employees to be pilots, renovations of bus station roofs, and fuel, far exceeded profit margins --- thus proving to be extremely unprofitable. By late 1946, this idea was entirely shelved.

Greyhound Lines, Inc. is the largest provider of intercity transportation serving over 2,300 destinations across the U.S., Canada, and Mexico, and remains the most profitable bus company in Northern America. It has been in existence since 1914 with its headquarters in Dallas,

Alas, greyhounds remain grounded.





FLU FIGHTER

Elderberry (SAMBUCUS nigra), sometimes known by the name black elder, has served as a popular food ingredient for centuries – especially in elderberry pie, wine, and jam. This herb has a long history as a flu remedy which remains its forte even today.

Get Back to Life, Quicker!

Elderberry will not keep you from getting sick, but evidence shows that elderberry users enjoy a quicker recovery from winter crud. By using this herb, you can expect to return to school or work faster than without it.

Elderberry seems to work best when taken early in an infection. Folks taking elderberry extract (as a liquid extract of the berries) in the day or two of an influenza-like illness recovered four days sooner than other people in research who were taking a placebo. Not only were those in the elderberry group back on their feet sooner, but they also did not take so much or as many medications for symptom relief.

Scientific research comes in numerous forms. One way to get deeper insights about a topic comes from meta-analysis. This means combining data from a few smaller studies to get a better feel for outcomes. Scientists at the Franklin Institute of Wellness, which serves as one of the only research-focused natural health institutions, did that by grouping several smaller studies to examine the health outcome of elderberry supple-




ments in a total of 180 patients with upper respiratory infections. This meta-analysis revealed solid benefits from elderberry supplementation in terms of quicker symptom relief.

How To Dose Yourself

Tea can be made from dried elderberry flowers. More modern forms of standardized liquid extract are also readily available, as are capsules/tablets, gummies, syrups, and lozenges. Elderberry syrup is typically taken in the amount of 1-tablespoon, four times daily for the first three to five (as needed) days of an illness.


